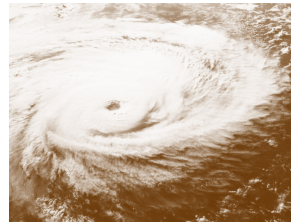

On **September 14**, the Church celebrates Holy Cross Day – the feast also known in the Eastern Church as “The Exaltation of the Cross.” This day commemorates the dedication of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem on September 14, 335. The huge complex of buildings was ordered by the Emperor Constantine to be built on the site of Jesus’ crucifixion and resurrection. In the midst of the buildings was a spacious courtyard through which worshippers had to walk as part of the liturgy. There the exposed top of the hill of Calvary was visible. During the construction excavations for the magnificent buildings (a work directed by Constantine’s mother Helena who herself had become a Christian), the workers had discovered a wooden relic thought to be a piece of the true cross on which Jesus died. Annually thereafter on Good Friday, solemn veneration of the Cross took place on this sacred ground, as well as daily prayers at the conclusion of Vespers.



Now, some 1672 years later, the Church continues to maintain the feast of the Holy Cross in mid-September. Perhaps this might be a good time to ask ourselves, what power does the Cross really hold in our lives? What difference does this ultimate expression of God’s love actually mean in our day-to-day challenges?

For me, the feast of the Holy Cross will be forever linked to hurricane season. Why? Because it was on Tuesday September 14 four short years ago that Hurricane Ivan was making its stormy way steadily toward the Florida Panhandle. I was far away from Florida finishing my seminary studies in New York City, my husband having recently moved back to our new home in Fort Walton Beach in preparation for my joining him in a few more short months. That dark night of September 14, 2004, the distance between us felt enormous. The threatening power of Mother

Nature was unquestionable and inescapable.

But that evening the Dean of our seminary preached a sermon that gave comfort, strength, and hope. Dean Ewing pointed to the ornately carved wooden cross that loomed above us in the seminary chapel and said: *Tonight we celebrate the feast of the Holy Cross – a day we focus directly on the cross of Jesus. For us the cross is the sign of God’s incredible love...there is no greater love. The cross is the extent to which God will go to bring us into relationship...I wonder how many of us, when we enter the Chapel and see the cross say to ourselves, ‘Here is the power that will transform the world...here is the power that is bringing the kingdom of God!’...To say God is love is to affirm that **the love we see most clearly on the Cross is the strongest force in all creation.*** [emphasis mine]

Think about that, my friends, next time the storms of life – whether meteorological, or medical, or emotional, or spiritual, or financial, or you-name-it – threaten your safety and well-being, or the safety and well-being of those you love. Cling to the power of the Cross of Christ and the love of God poured out there for all the world. Not even the dramatic and destructive power of the strongest of life’s hurricanes can equal the strong Love of God that embraces and redeems us all.

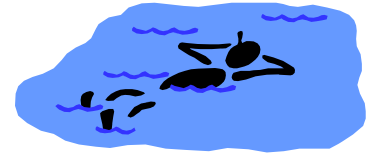
*Christian Ed is in the House!*

## *Your Vestry Needs You!*

St. Augustine is having one of its best years. It became a Parish, membership is up, giving is up, attendance is up, we have a wonderful new priest, we had a successful Pig Roast, the Bishop has visited us; and we know God is always present in our church. We know this by the friendship and caring of all our members.

I also think it is important that you realize what your Vestry does and why we need you.

In the Vestry Handbook, its opening paragraph states, "The Vestry of an Episcopal Church has three primary responsibilities. The first two are managerial: to take care of the parish finances and parish buildings. The third responsibility is to choose individuals to fill various positions of parish leadership and representation, the election of a rector, the choices of delegates to the Diocesan Convention, and the selection of other individuals as the Diocesan canons and parish by-laws may stipulate."

As you can see, we need to find

members of St. Augustine to help it grow spiritually. We need new candidates for vestry, Sunday School teachers, choir members, flower and altar guild members. When I was asked to be a vestry member, I thought it would be a one night per month meeting. My answer was 'yes' because I wanted to give back something for all the good success I had been given in my family and business life. I did not realize how much I would receive in return.

## Start a Sea of Change: The International Coastal Cleanup

The 2008 International Coastal Cleanup flagship event will be held **September 20**. To participate in our area, come to the parking lot at Navarre Beach at 8 a.m. with work gloves and sturdy shoes. Kayaks and snorkels will also be used to clean up the underwater areas near the shore.

In 1986, the ICC began with one woman walking along the beach of South Padre Island, Texas. She was appalled at the amount of trash she saw and she immediately felt compelled to do something about it. She organized a beach cleanup and in a mere two hours, 2,800 Texans picked up 124 tons of trash. Today, a worldwide movement grew out of

that single event with more than six million volunteers in 127 countries and all 55 U.S. states and territories over the last 23 years.

Ocean Conservancy's International Coastal Cleanup is a year-round effort keeping our ocean free from trash and safer for people and animals. The flagship event in September is a celebration of this effort and is the largest single-day volunteer event to protect our ocean and waterways.

During the International Coastal Cleanup, volunteers record each piece of trash picked up at sites around every major body of water around the world. Local and

regional coordinators then collect the raw data that is calculated by Ocean Conservancy including number of volunteers on each site, the number of pounds of trash removed, and what items were collected. Ocean Conservancy uses this data to produce a global snapshot of the issue of trash in our ocean.



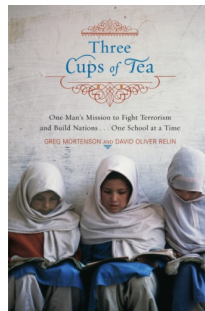
